~ TREASURERS REPORT ~

The start of the 2021-22 season saw us emerge from COVID-19 restrictions and attempt to return to normal Club operations. Ongoing border closures provided challenges for many attempting members to resume patrols, Club responsibilities. training other Regardless of the challenges, Club life slowly returned to normal thanks to the resilience of our members. For this dedication to Tugun SLSC, I sincerely thank you all for your efforts.

Despite the COVID-19 disruptions during the first half of the year, the Club has performed solidly, returning an operating surplus of \$77,293.65 for the 2022 financial year (\$9,758.64 in 2021).

Spetial thanks infectioning Shippessels number to the **the following viantrebutants:** funds agreement;

- The Tugun Nippers the contribution of revenues from BBQ, canteen & clothing operations continues to be impressive year on year. Thank you to all the parents & nippers that contribute so selflessly to this success.
- The Surf Club & Nipper sponsors: these members of the community continue to support us, ensuring our growth.
- SLSQ, SLSA, Federal Government, Queensland Government and Gold Coast City Council for providing grants & donations to enable us to continue Surf Life Saving operations.
- All the Raffle helpers a sincere thank you to all the members that assisted with raffles and the members draw every Thursday throughout the year. I would seriously be overwhelmed without your support.

The Club acquired the following major acquisitions through 2021/22.

- A Can-Am ATV for patrol use.
- A zodiac IRB The 'Hoddy'.
- 3 x New BOS ski's for use by Club athletes.

The Club dedicated resources to resolve the ongoing issues with the leaky Club roof. This problem was exacerbated during the recent period of monsoon like weather & the seriousness of this issue was evident to all. Special thanks to everyone involved in the process to finally remedy this problem.

This was a large and complex job requiring ongoing effort to diagnose and rectify.

Progress with the building certification project stalled due to QLD border restrictions, as the GCCC chief certifier resides in Melbourne and was unavailable to attend QLD for extended periods throughout the year. The ongoing building certification is a key milestone in our effort to install the Club's elevators. This work will continue through 2022-23 with the assistance of industry professionals engaged to specifically identify the project scope and execute the required works.

Key revenue positives for the year:

- Surplus Funds & donations from the Supporters Club: \$134,068.
- Rent from the Supporters Club: \$118,788.
- Membership fees: \$56,770
- Nipper BBQ, canteen & clothing sales: \$51,941
- Government grants: \$49,561
- Club raffle revenue: \$33,872
- Carnival hosting: \$11,588

Operating expenses continue to be tightly monitored. The Club balance sheet remains stable with a Net Asset position of \$2.101 million and cash reserves of \$269,737. The included Financial Report for 2021-22 contains comprehensive detail of all Club financial activities.




~ EDUCATION REPORT ~

Another challenging year competing with COVID and extreme weather events impacting training and skills maintenance. The COVID protocols having a huge influence on how things could be conducted. Even with these restrictions I feel the team of Chris Bindley, Ian Phillips, Peter Tighe and myself managed to achieve an impressive number of awards and skills updates. This accomplishment could only be reached with Sharon's administration skills, determination and persistence. Processing the vital elements of membership status, blue cards and CYRM inductions was a big task, as a minority of members took an eternity to complete them even with constant reminders. Renee also helped out doing the sign in's for a couple proficiencies to relieve a bit of Sharon's workload.

Awards & Proficiencies 2021-22 season

Over the six Skills Maintenance days (Proficiencies) we managed to update following skills: BM - 155, SRC - 8, IRBC - 55, IRBD - 33 & ART - 24.




Some of the other awards included CPR and radio.

New Award Courses

The Club ran a bronze & SRC course over the winter months, which experienced delays in completing due to covid. The September school holiday camp saw another 6 Bronze Medallion candidates trained with the assistance of Bilinga SLSC. We also, offered our Nipper parents an opportunity to complete an SRC course in late October, increasing water safety numbers for Nippers. We were also able to offer an IRB Crew & Drivers courses later in the season.

Other courses run though Branch/SLSQ

The new First Aid course included the ever-changing



directives from Resuscitation Council. Also, the new Advanced Resuscitation course (ART) included changes to Oxygen delivery protocols and vital signs checks and devices to measure temperature, blood pressure, pulse and Oxygen saturation levels in the blood.

There were 17 members completing the Provide First Aid (HLTAID011) course and 1 member completed an ART course.

Early in the season Pt Danger Branch forwarded a request for donation of redundant lifesaving equipment for emerging lifesaving in India. We had 6 old Ambu manikins and associated equipment that has had little use in last few seasons available to donate. With space being a premium, the manikins not being used now or the foreseeable future it seemed to be a perfect opportunity to reinvigorate there intended purpose. So, with trainers and the Boards consent we sent this equipment to their new home in India. With a few modifications we now have space to house all of our current equipment in training room cupboards.

In addition to the trainers and Sharon I would like to thank some other people for their contribution in helping to achieve these results. They include Sam Hamilton for his assistance in training the September camp. For assistance with IRB training, Geoff Wright, John Huntley—Chipper, Leonard Randall, Greg Loubser-Goldblatt, Raoul Somers and Damien Daly giving candidates a good mix of driving skills. Also, Rachael at PDB for her constant unbiased support in a broad range of technical and procedural issues. As

well as Ella Kinneally at SLSQ for supporting our awards application and processing.

In closing I am sorry if I missed thanking someone, memory not what it used to be. It has been a challenging year, but I think we fared quite well compared to some of the other PDB Clubs. However, in saying that it has not been all doom and gloom, with some good times and achievements made.

One of the more notable challenging days was during the IRBC & IRBD course. With the Tsunami warning beaches being closed, having to get SLSQ permission to train in Currumbin creek. Along with finding transport to get there. On arriving and lunching craft already felt like a day's work. It ended up being one of the most successful days of courses training. The public on the river bank got to see different; it must have looked quite amusing. Watching Ruthy Lee (water manikin) being dumped into the creek and being left there. We would then do a circle around in the IRB and practice various patent pickups. As there were no waves full attention could be made to good retrieval technique.

Finally thank you all for your support and help this year.

I wish to acknowledge and thank all the crews who I have swept and rowed with over the past 30 years. I have enjoyed my time, the challenges and the rewards including 4 gold medals and the opportunity to represent Australia on two occasions and well as representing Queensland on three occasions. I also wish to acknowledge the Tugun Surf Lifesaving Club and all those who have supported me and those who have taught me everything I know about Surf Boat racing over those years. I have loved the sport, made many great friends and have so many good memories.








NOTE 1: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Corporate Information

The financial statements are special purpose financial statements prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 1981 (Qld) and the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012 (Cth). The committee has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

Basis of Preparation

The financial statements are for the Tugun Surf Life Saving Club Inc as an individual entity, incorporated and domiciled in Australia. The Tugun Surf Life Saving Club Inc is an association incorporated in Queensland under the Associations Incorporation Act 1981 (Qld) and is registered as a charity under the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012 (Cth).

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historic costs and do not take into account changing money values or, except where stated specifically, current valuations of non-current assets.

The following Australian accounting standards have been applied in the preparation of these financial statements:

AASB 101 - Presentation of Financial Statements

AASB 107 - Statement of Cash Flows

AASB 108 - Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors

AASB 1048 - Interpretation of Standards

AASB 1054 - Australian Additional Disclosures

The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless stated otherwise, have been adopted in the preparation of these financial statements.

Accounting Policies

a. Income Tax

No provision for income tax has been raised as the association is exempt from income tax under Section 50-10 of the *Income Tax Assessment Act 1997* (Cth). Tugun Surf Life Saving Club Inc is a Public Benevolent Institution (PBI) and has been endorsed by the Australian Taxation Office to receive tax concessions. Further, Tugun Surf Life Saving Club Inc is endorsed as a Deductible Gift Recipient (DGR).

b. Comparative Figures

When required by these accounting policies, comparative figures have been adjusted to conform with changes in presentation for the current financial year. When required, comparative information is reclassified where appropriate to enhance comparability.

c. Economic Dependence

Tugun Surf Life Saving Club Inc is dependent on the Tugun Surf Life Saving Supporters Association Inc for funds used to meet it's financial commitments. At the date of this report the committee members have no reason to believe the Tugun Surf Life Saving Supporters Association Inc will not continue to support Tugun Surf Life Saving Club Inc.

d. Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO).

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the Statement of Financial Position.

Cash flows are presented on a gross basis. The GST components of cash flows arising from investing or financing activities which are recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO are presented as operating cash flows included in receipts from customers or payments to suppliers.

NOTE 1: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

e. Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgments

The committee of management evaluate estimates and judgments in the financial report based on historical knowledge and best available information. Estimates assume a reasonable expectation of future events and are based on current trends and economic data, obtained both externally and within the association.

Key estimates

The estimate of the useful life of leasehold improvements, plant and equipment is reviewed at least annually to confirm that the remaining life of material assets is reflected on the asset register. There were no other critical accounting estimates to be considered during the year or during preparation of this financial report.

Key judgments

The methods of depreciation are used to provide a consistent usage of the useful life of leasehold improvements, plant and equipment. The methods also allow, where required, for the leasehold improvements, plant and equipment to be fully written down at a specific point in time such as the end of the lease term. There were no other critical accounting judgments made by the committee of management.

f. Contributions

If and when Tugun Surf Life Saving Club Inc receives non-reciprocal contributions from the government or other parties for nothing or a nominal value the contributions would be recognised at the fair value on the date of acquisition upon which time an asset is taken up in the Statement of Financial Position and revenue in the Statement of Profit or Loss and Other Comprehensive Income.

g. Revenue

Revenue from the sale of goods is recognised upon the delivery of goods to customers.

Grant revenue is recognised in the Statement of Profit or Loss and Other Comprehensive Income when the association obtains control of the grant and it is probable that the economic benefits gained from the grant will flow to the association and the amount of the grant can be measured reliably.

Donations and bequests are recognised as revenue when received.

Interest revenue is recognised on a proportional basis taking into account the interest rates applicable to the financial assets.

Revenue from the rendering of a service is recognised upon the delivery of the service to the customers.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

h. Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at-call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of twelve months or less, and bank overdrafts.

i. Trade and Other Receivables

Trade and other receivables include amounts due from members as well as amounts receivable from other entities. Receivables expected to be collected within twelve months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

j. Inventories

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

NOTE 1: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

k. Property, Plant and Equipment

Each class of leasehold improvements, plant and equipment is carried at cost or fair value less, where applicable, accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

Leasehold improvements, plant and equipment

Leasehold improvements, plant and equipment are measured on the cost basis and are therefore carried at cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses. In the event the carrying amount of leasehold improvements, plant and equipment is greater than its estimated recoverable amount, the carrying amount is written down immediately to its estimated recoverable amount and impairment losses are recognised either in profit or loss or as a revaluation decrease if the impairment losses relate to a revalued asset. A formal assessment of recoverable amount is made when impairment indicators are present (refer to Note 1n for details of impairment).

Leasehold improvements, plant and equipment that have been contributed at no cost, or for nominal cost, are valued and recognised at the fair value of the asset at the date it is acquired.

Depreciation

The depreciable amount of leasehold improvements, plant and equipment is depreciated on a straight line basis over the asset's useful life to the association commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use. The rates used for each class of depreciable assets are:

The assets' residual values and useful lives are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at the end of each reporting period.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with the carrying amount. These gains or losses are included in the Statement of Profit or Loss and Other Comprehensive Income. When revalued assets are sold, amounts included in the revaluation reserve relating to that asset are transferred to retained surplus.

I. Employee Benefits

Retirement benefit obligations - superannuation benefits

All employees of the association receive defined contribution superannuation entitlements, for which the association pays the fixed superannuation guarantee contribution (currently 10.0% [10.5% from 01 July 2022] of the employee's average ordinary salary) to the employee's superannuation fund of choice. All obligations for unpaid superannuation guarantee contributions are measured at the (undiscounted) amounts expected to be paid when the obligation is settled and are recognised as trade and other payables under current liabilities in the association's Statement of Financial Position.

Short-term employee benefits

Provision is made for the association's obligation for short-term employee benefits. Short-term employee benefits are benefits (other than termination benefits) that are expected to be settled wholly within twelve months after the end of the annual reporting period in which the employees render the related service, including wages, salaries, annual leave and long service leave. Short-term employee benefits are measured at the (undiscounted) amounts expected to be paid when the obligation is settled. The association's obligations for short-term employee benefits are recognised as trade and other payables under current liabilities in the Statement of Financial Position.

NOTE 1: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

I. Employee Benefits (continued)

Long-term employee benefits

The association only classifies employees' long service leave entitlements as long-term employee benefits as they are not expected to be settled wholly within twelve months after the end of the annual reporting period in which the employees render the related service. Provision is made for the association's obligation for long-term employee benefits, which are measured at the present value of the expected future payments to be made to employees. Expected future payments incorporate anticipated future wage and salary levels, durations of service and employee departures, and are discounted at rates determined by reference to market yields at the end of the reporting period on government bonds that have maturity dates that approximate the terms of the obligations. Upon the remeasurement of obligations for long-term employee benefits, the net change in the obligation is recognised in profit or loss classified under employee benefits expense.

The association's obligations for long-term employee benefits are recognised as provisions under non-current liabilities in its Statement of Financial Position, except where the association does not have an unconditional right to defer settlement for at least twelve months after the end of the reporting period, in which case the obligations are recognised as trade and other payables under current liabilities in the Statement of Financial Position.

m. Trade and Other Payables

Trade and other payables represent the liabilities for goods and services received by the association during the reporting period that remain unpaid at the end of the reporting period. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within thirty days of recognition of the liability.

n. Impairment of Assets

At the end of each reporting period, the committee members assess whether there is any indication that an asset may be impaired. If such an indication exists, an impairment test is carried out on the asset by comparing the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs to sell and value in use, to the asset's carrying amount. Any excess of the asset's carrying amount over its recoverable amount is recognised immediately in profit or loss, unless the asset is carried at a revalued amount in accordance with another Standard (e.g. in accordance with the revaluation model in AASB 116). Any impairment loss of a revalued asset is treated as a revaluation decrease in accordance with that other Standard.

Where it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, the committee members estimate the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs.

o. Leases

Lease payments for operating leases, where substantially all the risks and benefits remain with the lessor, are recognised as expenses on a straight-line basis over the lease term.
